1 WELCOME & APOLOGIES

Apologies Charles Holroyd, Ward Cllr Juliet Henderson. Confirmed Nick Ralls, as Vice chairman, will chair the meeting.

- **2 MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING** of 20 June. Agreed, to be signed next meeting.
- **DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST** in items on the Agenda, none
- **4A** REPORT TO MEETING from Ward Cllr Onnalee Cubitt

Moto EIA Really important to counter this development proposal. Impact on the aquifer, on groundwater and watercourses at the source of the Loddon; impact on this whole area south of M3 will be horrific. To encourage as many people as possible to respond. See Agenda item 8.4 Planning.

Police and Crime Plan Consultation – PCC Donna Jones is still consulting on the priorities for her next Police and Crime Plan, to 19 August. *See Agenda item 5.3 Police Reports*.

Weekly food waste collections Local Government must respond to Environment Act requirements for separate food waste collections, and to meet 65% recycling targets. So proposal is to start weekly food waste collections from October 2025. Food waste will go to anaerobic digester; everyone will be provided with a year's supply liners ('biodegradable' – but the processing system removes and processes the liners separately). HCC will make greater provision for plastic recycling. Intention is to remove a third of waste from Grey Bin, this the only way will meet 65% target to bring down tonnage required by Environment Act. Grey bin collections will then reduce to fortnightly from September 2026.

Local Plan Update Received *c*7K responses to the Reg 18 consultation. Officers working through them – from all interest groups including developers – competing interests at play. Now looking to publish the Reg 18 Draft Plan at the start of next year; new Plan to be submitted by June 2025. But with new Government, not inconceivable may have to begin all over. Only have five years in any case before next update, continuous cycle of review.

Question re brownfield: Answer – Brownfield important aspiration; BDBC does own office space – Government report says must keep as office space; then the difficulty offices can be turned to housing via permitted development – no planning, no CIL, no social housing provision – is a nightmare. So yes brownfield first is a goal, but a limit on how much space have and can use. (Noted a trend of flats being built over out-of-town retail space.)

Question re structure of BDBC political adminstration Answer – No overall control by one party (as situation continuing from last year). Conservatives largest single party, but Council run by Joint adminstration – 'Independent Forum' of Independents and Liberals (and Greens), supported by Labour.

[Individual party figures at last election: Conservative 16; Labour 11; Lib Dems 11; B&D Independents 10; Independent 3; Greens 2; Women's Equality Party 1.]

Will the borough allocate more housing? Answer – National Government dictates the number of houses have to build – calculated via the 'Standard Method' and embedded in Local Plans. To meet this requirement, the Local Plan Update figures are based on a 'stepped trajectory' of 700 new homes for first five years and then 900 per annum after that; this will include 40% affordable housing. The previous Government make it clear that Plans not using the standard method would be found 'Unsound' at Inspection. To wait and see where heading with Labour.

How will you allocate affordable housing Answer – In the Local Plan is a requirement

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to build 40% affordable housing. Working on projects on brownfield sites to facilitate delivery of social housing. Inherited a failure in social housing – Buckskin and South Ham should have been regenerated 20 years ago. Working with Sovereign – Buckskin will be regenerated alongside development in Manydown. (Comment re importance of good links with Homes England.)

Further question / comment: With 5K on the housing list, and 40% of 700 delivered a year, this will take a while... Answer – Manydown North will delver 3.5K overall, regeneration will bring more housing numbers. Also looking for 'social rented' (@50% market rate) – council housing – for which there is a massive need. But viability, or developer claims of unviability, is a massive problem. (Comment that some developers not bringings sites forward; claims of problems with funding via Homes England re accessing Government grants.)

Question re Hants as a unitary authority – How might this progress? Response: To bear in mind Portsmouth and Southampton are Unitary councils in their own right, don't come within HCC. The third biggest town is Basingstoke which should a priority for HCC but never has been. HCC devolution won't include Portsmouth and Southampton, but would include Basingstoke. Would have to pass all business rates to county; Basingstoke a comparative wealthy borough due to legacy of land transfers when became a London overspill town. Is going to be very dependent on what the new Government says. (Onnalee indicated preference for Unitary – but with Basingstoke with Hart and Rushmoor.)

Cllr Cubitt left the meeting with the thanks of the Parish Council, and with thanks for her speedy interventions on behalf of residents.

4B PUBLIC SESSION

.1 Weston Road footway See also Agenda item 7.2

<u>Discussion</u> Two clear elements of verge from the pinch point section to the pond.

- 1. Section 1 c17m of footway behind the black and white bollards at the 'pinch point' where the road is narrowest.
- 2. Section 2 leading to the pond where the road widens and verge leads into a Yew hedge.
- 3. Section 1 is the length quoted for a hoggin / scalpings footway and clearly much used. An observed tendency for people to walk along this section of the verge where the road narrow and they can't see the traffic particularly when walking towards the pond.
- 4. Section 2 People naturally tend walk in road here as the road widens and visibility opens out to the pond. Concerns raised regarding the Yew hedge should there be a plan to cut this back. Concerns that would harm the setting of the adjacent property and the setting of the pond area, a focal point of the Conservation Area. Additional concerns that Yew often not respond well to hard pruning.
- 5. <u>Section 1</u> The grass never gets chance to regenerate. In wet weather becomes very muddy, slippery, and difficult to walk on and for children to cycle thus when conditions underfoot are very bad, people walk in the road. This a problem along the narrow pinch point where difficult to see traffic approaching from pond direction, on a blind bend. The concern is that in these conditions, people and people with young children can't easily escape from the carriageway. And no option but to get off the road here if a tractor or lorry coming. (Comment that someone has slipped and slipped into the road.)
- 6. Agreed that two distinctly different sections of verge to be considered differently.
- 7. <u>For Section 1, the proposal</u> is for a solid surface, but one that looks informal and would fit with the pond environment. Not paving or asphalt which is urbanising and not appropriate here. Looking to a compacted, bound gravel / hoggin surface up to the kerb; the vegetation would grow back to the path edge on the hedge side. Needs to be a solution that everyone is comfortable with.
- 8. Means to install this latter subject to grant funding. Quote received was for £2.5K including machinery hire, labour, banksmen, materials and disposal.
- 9. Grant funding received to date of £500 from Juliet Henderson's County Council devolved budget. Proposal has already been put forward for a volunteer scheme, and offer of low loader provision to remove the waste soil. The £500 would be towards materials.

Two members of the public left the meeting with the thanks of the Parish Council.

Brief emailed report submitted by PCSO Andy Jones (25 July 2024)

'Criminal Damage – Between the 23rd July 2000hrs to 24th July 0500hrs

'A pane of glass in the back of a greenhouse has been shattered and a metal ball bearing was found on the floor of the greenhouse. The back of the greenhouse faces the road so assume it was shot with a catapult from the road, through a beech hedge.

'That's it for the last 30 days, awaiting the harvest to get in full swing before the next trend of crime commences I am sorry to say.'

Noted re the ball bearings, seems the season of the catapults is coming back, comment this tends to concur with pheasant release time.

- ii 'Hants' alert' of 10 July Hare coursing incidents reported in Hampshire **APPENDIX III.**Discussion
 - This activity associated with large scale organised hare running and gambling links to gambling reported in the Far East. Hares generally quite rare but where there are hare populations, won't stop this activity.
 - The local approach via Hants Highways for seasonal closure of the BOAT evidently a long term negotiation with many interest groups. And 'seasonal closure' won't prevent activity at this time of year. Whether this approach can be successful in grappling with the problem? Additional approaches needed.

AGREED To engage with PCC Donna Jones via consultation process to request input and pressure from the police to County, that this be made high priority. (Consultation closes 19 August.) Action Clerk to submit response on behalf of Parish Council.

.4 Parish Lengthsman July report

- All the council's assets are in good order.
- Footpaths are all passable need to instruct County LM to cut FP 12 [by church & Manor Fm]
- I have a new latch for the gate at the cemetery end of FP9 (I will fit it when I have had it welded so the bolt cannot be undone).
- The gatepost at Weston Road end of FP9 has rotted off at the gate hinge end. [Gates usually landowner responsibility.]
- Another oil drum has been deposited along Bidden Road almost opposite where the first one was dumped. (The council are aware of this and are investigating this as fly tipping.)
- Re the locked gate on the playground I will look at in time for the meeting.
- There has been a lot of pothole repairs done around the roads.

Discussion

- i Re the gatepost on FP9. **APPENDIX IV.**
 - Landowner probably Upton Grey House, to approach in first instance?
 - Potentially for volunteers.
 - If post is provided, Countryside Services may well provide volunteers to install. At the end of FP7 at Hoddington Farm, the Estate provided a kissing gate which Council put in.
 - The post isn't going to fall over, wire is holding it up.

To engage with Upton Grey House in first instance (not urgent).

- ii Re the report of locked pedestrian gate to playground, later found no longer locked. (No apparent reason, explanation.)
- iii Noted re Playground maintenance that Richard Randall has retired. His company 'Dick Randall Services' is taken over and continuing.

.4 MOTO (MSA M3J6) APPENDIX VIII.

<u>17/03487/FUL</u> (Validated Nov 2017) Land Adjacent to M3J6. Construction of a new Motorway Service Area (MSA) to comprise an amenity building, lodge, drive thru coffee unit, associated car, coach, motorcycle, caravan, HGV and abnormal load parking, and a fuel filling station with retail shop, together with alterations to the adjoining roundabout on the M3 and slip roads to form an access point and works to the highway. Provision of landscaping, infrastructure and ancillary works.

Consultation date at the moment to 07 August. Comment that this is about developing a base for retail and leisure / service provision.

AGREED Parish Council to respond to EIA consultation – that environmental damage makes the proposed development at this location unjustifiable.

Main issues include contamination of the groundwater and aquifer at a source of the River Loddon, an environmentally sensitive Chalk stream and valueable and internationally rare ecological habitat – and on the designated Local Nature Reserve.

(To note Winslade has instructed a hydrogeologist to consider Moto's evidence.)

Estate golf course To consider raising concerns to BDBC regarding apparent extension of golf course already constructed within Estate grounds. Earthworks and engineering works on agricultural land require planning permission.

Discussion

- It may be there is permission for works agreed as part of landscaping conditions which BDBC don't publish.
- It would be reasonable to ask BDBC for clarification mentioning that people around village have raised concerns.
- The Parkland is a heritage asset as part of the Conservation Area and setting of Hoddington House.

Agreed to make initial enquiries via the land agent.

APPENDIX II BOROUGH COUNCILLOR REPORT - JULY 2024

Feedback on Borough's Local Plan

Over 7,000 comments made on the Draft Plan that will guide development and planning decisions in Basingstoke & Deane until at least 2040 are available to view.

Earlier in the year, lots of people took the chance to get involved in forming the borough's next Local Plan, which will shape development in our areas for the next 15 years. The Local Plan includes where homes, and other types of development, will be built and how the environment can be protected. During the borough-wide consultation, the council encouraged people to have their say on the plan and policies supporting it and these comments can now be viewed on the council's website. These comments are now being considered to help shape the next version of the Local Plan, which will be consulted on early next year.

Couch to 2K course

There's still time for people to sign up to a new couch to 2K course for anyone looking to make positive changes to their wellbeing.

Following a successful pilot course organised earlier this year, a new eight-week course, supported by the council, will run from Wednesday 31 July to Wednesday 18 September. The course will take place at Down Grange Sports Facility in Kempshott from 6pm to 7pm and costs £30 to be paid up front. No previous experience is required and the course is designed for complete beginners who want to build up their fitness to achieve either walking or jogging the 2km distance. It includes exercises to help those attending to build strength week to week to walk or jog the 2k distance safely.

People interested in joining the course should contact the Sport and Wellbeing team. Places will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

Action plan to kick-start rejuvenation of Top of the Town

On Tuesday, the Cabinet announced a package of improvements aimed at breathing new life into the Top of the Town and enhancing its vibrancy.

As a priority, the Cabinet has been working with businesses and partners to explore issues and solutions to improve the town's historic heart.

The plan focuses on measures to make sure the Top of the Town is a welcoming place for residents, businesses and visitors and celebrates the heritage of the area. This includes plans to improve the environment with a deep clean, repainting safety railings, enhanced schedule of street cleaning, maintenance of green spaces and planters and exploring options for decorative lighting and extra planting.

The council is also set to launch a new grant scheme to encourage business owners to improve and maintain their shop fronts and is exploring other initiatives to encourage shoppers to visit the Top of the Town. To support a thriving café culture in the Top of the Town, the council is making it easier for businesses to have outdoor seating areas by reducing the level of public liability insurance required. And working with venues in the Top of the Town, the council will also encourage more live music to enhance the arts and culture scene in the area. Green Flag success for borough's parks

Three popular parks in Basingstoke and Deane have been awarded the prestigious Green Flag, putting them among the very best parks in the UK.

The council's Beggarwood Park, Eastrop Park and War Memorial Park have again gained Keep Britain Tidy's Green Flag award, the international quality mark for parks and green spaces, for being beautifully maintained, clean and safe, with good facilities for visitors.

Beggarwood Park has scooped the Green Flag award for its second year, while Eastrop Park celebrates its 25th award and War Memorial Park has achieved the standard for a 17th year. The Green Flag scheme aims to raise the standard of parks and green spaces and reflects the hard work of the council's grounds maintenance, street cleansing and ranger teams that care for the green spaces for everyone to enjoy.

Eastrop paddling pool open

Free sports and activities including tennis and pickleball, cricket and group exercise sessions will take place between 11am to 3pm.

There will also be opportunities to watch hockey, dance, gymnastic and exercise displays, get hands on with nature and talk to local groups about the activities they offer and how to get involved.

Several of the events, including tennis sessions from Basingstoke Tennis Centre and an Earth Walk led by the council's Ranger team, must be booked in advance. But other activities which include cricket, scooting and BMX; music, nature and craft activities and a mini pitch and putt are available to those turning up on the day. Anyone taking part in the BMX or skatejam sessions must wear a helmet and have suitable footwear.

A number of exercise classes will be put on during the day including Calisthenics, Boxfit, Bootcamp and Ab Attack. Spaces will be limited per class and places will be offered on a first come first served basis.

Borough news and updates

Update from Hampshire Together programme

The NHS Hampshire Together programme has sent an update on the project following a 14-week consultation period which ended in March.

The consultation looked at how £700 to £900 million should be invested to modernise our hospitals and improve the quality and sustainability of health services in Hampshire for the future, with over 98,000 interacting with the consultation. An report outlining all the activity during the public consultation has been published.

NHS Hampshire and Isle of Wight engaged Opinion Research Services, an independent research company, to analyse all the responses to the consultation and provide a comprehensive picture of the views of those who responded. This has been collated in an independent consultation report which has also been published.

The content of the independent consultation report will be considered by Hampshire County Council's Joint Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee on Monday 22 July.

The NHS will formally respond to the Joint Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee in the summer, setting out the process for considering the points that they have raised. This will help in the development of the final proposal and the Decision-Making Business Case is expected to be published later this year.

Have your say on the Police and Crime Commissioner's new plan

The Police and Crime Commissioner Donna Jones has opened a public consultation to develop her next Police and Crime Plan.

The Commissioner is keen to gather feedback from the public on how she can work with the Chief Constable over the next four years to deliver on the public's local policing priorities. As an elected official, it is her duty to listen to public concerns. Each priority in the new plan will be designed based on direct feedback from residents.

There is a survey to have your say and share with your communities. The public consultation is open until Monday 19 August and the Police and Crime Commissioner will share the results in the autumn.

Our steps to a greener Basingstoke and Deane

Greener bin trucks driving down council's carbon emissions

Over 288 tonnes of carbon emissions have already been saved in three months from fuelling the bin trucks that collect waste and recycling in the borough with a low-carbon biofuel.

Since April, the waste and recycling collection vehicles have been swapped to hydrogenated vegetable oil as an alternative fuel with up to 98% lower emissions than diesel, according to government conversion factors.

The move to a more environmentally friendly fuel has more than halved the council's carbon footprint compared to the same period last year and is part of its work to become carbon neutral by December 2025 to help tackle the climate emergency.

APPENDIX III POLICE - HAMPSHIRE ALERT 10 JULY 2024

HARE COURSING INCIDENTS REPORTED IN JULY IN HAMPSHIRE



Hare coursing has started already with police receiving reports this week, particularly in the North of Hampshire.

Suspicious vehicles, suspected to be involved in coursing, have been spotted on farmland in areas including Kingsclere, Hannington, and Herriard.

During one incident in Kingsclere on 5 July, a farmer was threatened with a catapult, and an incident in Herriard reported on 9 July saw an offending vehicle narrowly avoid colliding with a victim's dog. This vehicle was later located and seized by police in Liphook, and a Lurcher dog was seized by police in Herriard.

Coursing not only involves the poaching of hares, but often sees significant damage caused to the farmland by individuals and vehicles trespassing, in addition to intimidation and threats of violence towards landowners.

We anticipate seeing further incidents elsewhere in the county, and urge people to be aware and to report coursing and associated damage to us.

If the crime is in progress, call 999 quoting Operation Galileo.

We would like to remind people to never approach the individuals involved in this type of crime – your safety is priority.

If it is safe to do so, you can consider obtaining any photos or video/Dash Cam footage to provide to the police.

When calling the police, provide as much information as you can, such as:

Are the suspect/s alone or in a group?

Do they have equipment with them?

Do they have dogs or firearms with them?

What type of dogs?

Where are they going - direction of travel if leaving/just left?

Where have they been?

What do they look like?

How many vehicles, what are the number plates and vehicle models or any distinctive damage/marks visible?

Any damage caused to fence/gates/fields?

Name of landowner

Has there been any intimidation of the landowner, Farmer, Agent?



Provision of landscaping, infrastructure and ancillary works.

A new and important consultation is now open for comment

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT CONSULTATION please respond

After years of ongoing pressure it has finally been decided that the MSA proposal be subject to a full Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). Planning must take into account statutory designations, and the designation of Black Dam Ponds & Crabtree Plantation as a Local Nature Reserve added some weight to the argument that environmental risk be fully examined.

This consultation therefore focuses on risk and potential damage to the natural environment resulting from a MSA in this location.

A response need only be brief but please raise any concerns you have; the closing date for consultation (on going to press) is 07 August.

Points to consider:

- 1. The MSA is proposed for an environmentally sensitive site
- 2. This is a site with shallow groundwater conditions 'a principal aquifer' which feeds the Loddon, an ecologically rare and valuable chalk stream
- 3. 'Mitigation' proposals cannot prevent contamination of the aquifer
- 4. The SuDS (Sustainable Drainage System) proposals are inappropriate as they include infiltration to ground water
- 5. Ongoing risk of oil-polluted discharges entering groundwater and the watercourses with potential for major oil spills from fuel tanks
- 6. Limited allowance for climate change and extreme weather events
- 7. Additional foul water and sewage discharge to the Loddon
- 8. Proximity of Grade I listed Hackwood Park and recently-designated Black Dam and Crabtree Local Nature Reserve (LNR)
- 9. Significant light pollution and its impact on local bat colonies
- 10 Visual impact on the surrounding area, including the LNR.

Documents produced on behalf of Moto of course seek to show that environmental impacts can be overcome, and risk mitigated. Winslade Parish has commissioned a Hydrogeologist to consider Moto's evidence. A detailed letter from Winslade (including the points above) is reproduced on the Parish Council website.
